


Dr. Harmeet Gill is an infectious diseases specialist at the HopeHealth Medical Plaza in Florence providing services such as HIV/AIDS and Hepatitis C treatment. "We are kind of like the FBI," Gill explains, "We have to look for all possible causes, treating [cases] like a mystery, examining head to toe to treat the whole patient." Dr. Gill has vast experience managing rural health initiatives, running the national polio eradication program in India and receiving a state-level award for efficiently managing a 600-person cholera outbreak. "Our response was so well-coordinated that even with [few] resources, we were able to prevent any deaths," shares Gill. Dr. Gill is fluent in English, Hindi, and Punjabi, is a member of The Infectious Disease Society of America and the American Medical Association, and, "I even break dance," jokes Gill, "when I dance, everything breaks around me!"



Dedication for the Streater Building Project





On February 27, HopeHealth held a dedication for the **Streater Building project** at the Hyatt Place Downtown featuring refreshments from local Black-owned businesses and an overview of the building's future. The Streater building is the last remaining African American architectural landmark of the downtown business district in Florence. HopeHealth purchased the building in 2018 in the hopes of utilizing it as a place to provide value-based community services outside of the traditional scope of health care. Upon completion of its revitalization, this HopeHealth project will strengthen community engagement and decrease barriers to care by enhancing programs focused on serving seniors, Veterans, and Black men.





In February, members of the **HopeHealth development team** partnered with the American Heart Association to host **Heart Healthy Barbershop Tours** in Florence, Lake City, Manning, and Orangeburg. Staff visited local barbershops to educate on blood pressure management, providing blood pressure information and free lunch at each location. To keep this initiative moving forward in each community, the participating barbershops also received a free blood pressure monitor and training on how to check their customers' blood pressure.

Aiyanna Johnson, FNP


